So you have collected your results...what next?

Good Results!

Congratulations! You worked hard and the results came through. Phone your family and friends and let them know the good news.

Think you should have got better grades?

Speak to a teacher or exam staff. Have a look at your grade score and check it against the exam boards UMS Grade Boundaries (can be found online). If any of your scores seem strangely low, or if you have missed a higher grade by only a few points, you could request a review of marking or moderation or request a remark

Try to do this soon after you receive your results, as there are deadlines involved, and fees for remarking. Letters will be included in your results envelope for you to complete and return.

Disappointed with your grades?

Speak to a teacher to see if they can help. Employers, colleges and universities want proof that you are going to stay and can see a course or job to the end.

You have demonstrated this by achieving a final result!

Remarks

The school deadline for asking for a remark is Friday 14th September 2018

Any requests that arrive after this date will not be processed.

Generally, for subjects like English and History where the marking is subjective and doesn't have a strict right or wrong answer, your grade is more likely to change. This is because one examiner might have a different viewpoint on your answer to another.

However, with less subjective subjects like Maths and Sciences, your grade is less likely to change, as there is a strict mark scheme. It's much more advisable to request a remark in subjective subjects as it is more likely to change, but remember that your mark can go up or down. It is advisable to speak to a teacher before making a final decision.
