
Money Matters Opportunity from the Maths Faculty



Students in Year 10 enjoyed an enlightening course recently from a local bank, focusing on children and young people learning about money. Many surprised faces expressed shocked looks when realising the cost of living, the challenge of saving, the pitfalls of easily available credit solutions and how important planning and saving is for a secure future.

When asked questions like, "Have you ever thought about what money actually means to you?" pupils discussed what money habits they had established so far and what they hoped for in the future. They learned that good budgeting would actually allow them to put luxury or fantasy items onto a spreadsheet and see what it would take to achieve their short term and long term dreams.



Premier League Means Business!



A group of Year 9 students have been offered a fantastic opportunity to take part in the Premier League Enterprise scheme, which is delivered by Premier League football clubs in partnership with Sport Relief.

Since its promotion to the Premier League, Brighton & Hove Albion has joined the scheme via their Albion in the Community division. The award-winning enterprise scheme aims to help young people in local communities to enhance their life skills, help to improve their educational outcomes and to increase awareness of the world of work.

The students visited the fabulous Amex Stadium to attend the launch of the 10-week programme and spent a very interesting day. Student Toby told us, "We arrived at the stadium with students from other local schools and were first of all given a tour of the stadium itself. We went right to the top of the stands, around the pitch, we saw the home and away dressing rooms and the warm-up station, as well as interview rooms and offices. It was really interesting."

What did Toby think the enterprise programme would be about? "I think it will teach us about finance and business. Brighton & Hove Albion have the chance to make more profit now that they're in the Premier League. We talked about possibly expanding the stadium, but they would need to stay in the Premier League to make that possible. They will have to see how that goes."

"People from the Albion will be coming to work with us in school once a week for about 10 weeks and we will be using the football club as our business model. I think it will be very useful to learn more practical stuff in school, about how to deal with money and about business, so I'm really looking forward to being part of this programme."

Thanks to Premier League Enterprise and Albion in the Community for giving this opportunity to our students and we will keep you updated on their progress.

Royal Veterinary College Visit Enthrals Students



As part of the University of Brighton's widening participation programme, a group of Longhill High School students aged from 13 to 16 were given the opportunity to visit the Royal Veterinary College in Camden recently.

On arriving at the impressive Royal Veterinary College, the students visited one of the lecture theatres to hear about the courses on offer and were given a talk by a current student who explained what life is like as a student there. One of the most popular courses involves learning about exotic animal species, which includes learning about their habitats and how important conservation is to stop them becoming endangered.

After lunch in the College Cafeteria, students visited one of the dissection rooms. Students stood on a raised viewing area, overlooking the room, to watch a dissection taking place; "It's all treated in a very matter-of-fact and scientific way." explained Year 9 student Spencer. "They have a clinic nearby which passes on animals that have died (with the owners' permission of course), so that they can be studied by the students there. It's very important to understand the anatomy of an animal if you are going to be able to give it the best possible treatment."

In another of the College's many classrooms, students were fascinated by the task of trying to identify different animal bones. "There were many different bird specimens on show." said Laura, from Year 11. "There were skeletons of geese, swans, parakeets – all kinds of birds – so we could compare differences between the very large and the very small."

Laura, who hopes to study veterinary medicine, continued "It's not just about caring for animals. By studying them you can look at how they've evolved, how different species relate to each other and how they might evolve in the future."

The last visit of the day was to meet a group of calves and to learn more about these endearing creatures; as well as learning facts about the cows, students were also able to stroke them, sketch them and find their heartbeats with a stethoscope.

"It was an interesting trip," said Spencer, "It's not necessarily what I want to do, but it's given me an idea of what kind of career it is." As for Laura's conclusion, "It's confirmed for me that veterinary medicine is what I want to study – and I really want to go there to do it!"

Independence for Nick thanks to Wheelchair Donation

Year 10 student, Nick Boyland, is over the moon with his new power-assisted wheelchair, generously donated by Genting Casinos and CHIPS.

The CHIPS charity was founded on behalf of the casino and gaming industry and raises funds to purchase specialised powered wheelchairs for young people with disabilities. Working alongside Motus Medical, who are experts in the field of mobility, each wheelchair is a custom-fit for its new owner.

Nick was nominated to receive the wheelchair by staff members at Longhill High and Hillside, who are the local authority outreach specialists for young people with physical disabilities. He is absolutely delighted with his new mode of transport, as are his family, who joined Nick for the presentation in Brighton recently.

"It will give me independence," Nick told us, "At the moment I have to have someone with me all the time in school and sometimes that has made it difficult for me to mix with other students and make friends. Now I will be able to get around the school site on my own at break and lunchtime, which will be great!"

Generous employees from Genting Casinos took part in a marathon in Madrid to raise funds for the CHIPS charity, which resulted in Nick's new wheels. "I'd like to say a huge thank you to the people who raised the money for my new chair" said Nick. "It will take me a little while to get used to it, but I can't wait to get started!"

Learning Support teacher Siobhan Hewitt has worked closely with Nick since he started at Longhill High; she told us, "We are all very proud of Nick. He is a hard working student with high aspirations and is currently planning to become an accountant. Having the wheelchair will increase his independence and give him more freedom to make the choices he wants to make. Longhill High would like to thank Julia Cornwell from Hillside Outreach, with whom we worked collaboratively on this application for a new wheelchair."

A group of Year 10 higher ability students from Longhill High School visited the University of Sussex recently to take part in a widening participation event. As well as having a look around the impressive university campus and sampling the delights of one of its cafeterias, the students took part in two interactive workshops.

The morning session was a computing challenge where students had an opportunity to experiment with coding their own 'Internet of Things' system. Student Tommy explained, "We loaded a game onto a tiny console and then added our own coding to analyse and change the way it worked. We entered new coding to alter the way the game would respond, the positioning of controls, the heat of the battery – all the things that would help to improve performance."





The next session was called 'Shaping Sound' and was perfect for those with a keen interest in physics. Tommy and his friend told us, "It was really clever, because we could 'see' the soundwaves, or actually we could feel them on our hands." They went on, "The sound frequencies they used were really high ones and they bounced off the nerves in our hands, so they felt like air. The teacher also put tiny polystyrene beads into the sound wave machine and you could see them bouncing up and down as the waves hit them."

"They also showed us how sound waves can bend around your body and move from in front to behind you. They will use this research to make better speakers."

Students were able to ask questions of the University Student Ambassadors, who told them something of life on campus, the different courses available, as well as funding and accommodation options.

We asked the students if they had enjoyed the trip. "I really enjoyed seeing how much science is progressing;" said Tommy. "I like physics and could see that people work really hard to research things and test them to their limits. Research can lead to unexpected discoveries and breakthroughs — it's something I'd like to do in the future."




BOOKS ON PRESCRIPTION






